The 2026 National Survey on Health and Disability (NSHD) Will Launch in October!

The National Survey on Health and Disability (NSHD) is an ongoing survey of adults with disabilities that asks questions about disability, health status, housing, health care, health insurance, transportation, community participation and other aspects of daily life. This is the seventh time the NSHD has been conducted.

The NSHD project page includes additional information about what sort of topics the survey covers, research articles using data from previous NSHD waves, how to request data access for disability researchers, and more.

See How NSHD Data is Used

Data from the NSHD are important to show the impact of policies on the health, quality of life and community participation of adults with disabilities. Publications in journals is one way these findings are disseminated. One recent article using NSHD data is "Reasons for cannabis use among adults with disabilities: Findings from the 2023-2024 National Survey on Health and Disabilities."

This paper used data from the 2023/24 NSHD to look at who uses cannabis. The findings show that people with disabilities generally use cannabis more than people without disabilities and their top reasons for cannabis use are pain management and as a sleep aid.

"Mental health service utilization among people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and serious mental illness before and during the emergence of telehealth services" examines Medicaid recipients' use of services across four states.

Teens and young adults usually had the highest levels of service use, and use of services varied greatly based on disability diagnosis.

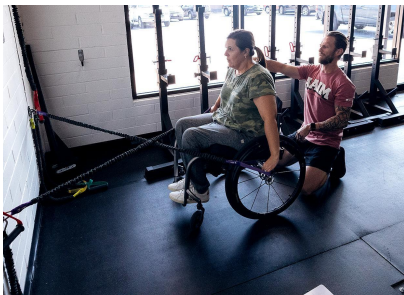

Fitness Research in Our Communities

An ongoing research project with participants in Kansas, Missouri, and Texas is examining how community-based Functional Fitness can improve health, physical function, and access to exercise for people with disabilities.

KU-IHDPS Assistant Research Professor Lyndsie Koon leads this project, in which participants take part in Functional Fitness classes led by trained coaches with experience adapting movements for people with all different types of mobility disabilities.

People with disabilities often face barriers to being

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lack of disability-related knowledge among fitness professionals. This project is part of a broader effort to identify effective, sustainable ways to expand access to inclusive community-based exercise opportunities for people with disabilities across the U.S.

Integrated Employment

An employment-focused project in Kansas has led to nearly 200 people with disabilities finding jobs in their communities.

By using a variety of supports, including job development services, career discovery activities, targeted case management, vocational rehabilitation and personalized job support, workers were able to find competitive employment in the retail, service, and trade industries.

Researchers hope this work leads to better data tracking showing that people can find jobs in their communities with competitive wages that not only improve their lives but also have positive impacts on their states' economies and budgets.

ANG Presentations

In May, IHDPS researchers presented at the 2026 Alliance for NIDILRR Grantees (ANG) annual conference (formerly known as NARRTC).

"Using the National Survey on Health and Disability (NSHD) to Advance Survey Design, Disability Measurement, and Longitudinal Methods" shared different ways researchers can use NSHD data.

Presentations included an overview of the NSHD, a new tool that makes it easier to organize people's written descriptions of their disabilities, and ways to use responses from people who have taken the NSHD more

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than once to understand how their lives and health change over time.

"Prevalence Data and Themes from the 2025 NSHD Modules on Medical Ableism" shared findings about the experiences of people with disabilities in health care, including how often people reported experiencing ableism and common themes in those experiences.
